From the Desk of Sheryl Duquette

As the ECC Perkins Assistant Project Director for Service Learning I am thrilled to have the opportunity to support faculty who are enhancing their courses through service learning as well as those who are trying to get their service learning courses, programs and projects off the ground. When asked to contribute to the CTLA newsletter, my thought was what a terrific venue to highlight the wonderful projects faculty, students and community partners are working on. I hope you are inspired by the service work happening here at ECC!

The initial spotlight is on **Occupational Therapy and the Belle Center**.

David Merlo, Professor of Occupational Therapy teaches courses related to assistive technology, psychosocial rehabilitation, and therapeutic communication and is the fieldwork coordinator for the program.

David has found a way to merge areas of interest and expertise through teaching website development. Knowing there are numerous practical elements involved in developing websites that makes it possible to adapt the process to address virtually any academic or therapeutic objectives - from teaching computer literacy, to addressing academic objectives (reading, writing, arithmetic, etc.), to infusing creativity and self-expression, to facilitating self-directed exploration, self-help, wellness self-management, and recovery.

Students in David's OT -105-01 Occupational Computer Application course are working with children who attend an afterschool program at the Belle Center, 104 Maryland Street: (left click/open hyperlink) <http://www.thebellecenter.org>. The students work one-on-one with the children in building personal websites. The primary objective of the WEBKIDS project is to facilitate inter-generational and cross-cultural learning through collaborative partnerships. And, by involving my own students in teaching others, I've added yet another dimension in which my students - engaged in service learning - are able to learn about culture, teaching strategies, therapeutic modalities, therapeutic rapport, and technology."

Digi[cation] and e-Portfolio software Comes to ECC.

On May 13, 1:30 PM, Martie Dixon and Pat Ryan will be holding a hands on workshop for HPER faculty and selected students on how to navigate the Digi[cation] software.

As part of the assessment plan for HPER the department has agreed to use the e-Portfolio assessment tool as a capstone project for students' assessment.

Martie Dixon and I recommended using this software to HPER after we were introduced to Digation at a League of Innovations conference last year. There were other products on the market, but we felt this was the most interesting and beneficial for our needs.

Since a number of our students transfer to 4-year institutions, for a small nominal fee they will be able to transport and add to their portfolios in the future, showcasing their work and achievements.
